LOCAL ARTIST ASPHATE BRINGS INSPIRATION AND ART TO ANAWIM APARTMENT

Last summer, Anawim staff members and community volunteers rallied together to help paint one of Anawim's 3-story apartment buildings. While painting, the energy of the building noticeably lifted and conversations began regarding the impact of paint and art on quality of life.

One block away, on the corner of 13th and Forest, a heart-wrenching tribute to the toll of gun violence is displayed on the wall of Creative Visions. The mural was created by Des Moines artist, ASPHATE.

In an anything-can-happen mindset, an Anawim staffer contacted ASPHATE to discuss the possibility of adding art to the recently painted apartment building. We were humbled when ASPHATE shared his appreciation for Anawim's work in our community. In support of those we serve, he offered to bring his talents and countless, colorful, non-toxic spray paints to the blank canvas walls of our apartment.

ASPHATE and his team had some memorable interactions with tenants throughout his painting sessions. The first day when the Louie Armstrong mural was coming to life, one resident smiled and exclaimed, "I am never moving!" His work was already bringing a sense of pride and belonging to the building. During another session, a couple approached ASPHATE and asked if he was the one who had painted art by the MLK bridge. When they learned yes, they shared a a memory with him:

"You took a break [from painting the MLK bridge] and were eating a pizza and shared some with us. We were living under the bridge at the time and now we live here... This means you are painting our home for the second time."

About The Artist:

ASPHATE, commonly known as PHATE, moved to Des Moines in 2002. He has

been a graff writer for the past 13 years. Graff writing is an art that involves all [spray] can control. No stencils or projectors. Most of ASPHATE's art is improvised at the wall, but he sometimes will sketch out a concept beforehand.

On why he chose to work with Anawim

Housing: "I enjoy new experiences and rocking the interior of an apartment building (with permission) was definitely a new experience that I welcomed. I could identify with the people in the neighborhood and the residents. Myself and my partner LIM were given creative freedom, which is extremely important to me. We wanted to bring color work and imagery that would add uplifting energy to the space." - ASPHATE

EXPANDING CHOICES IN HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES

By the time Genesta came to Anawim

Housing at the age of 29, she had experienced
homelessness five different times. "I've been
through a lot. I aged out of foster care when I was
18," she said, "but I'm still here and I'm still moving
forward." After achieving housing stability and
gaining full-time employment, Genesta is
preparing to move on.

"I appreciate everything Anawim has done, but I'm ready to leave," said Genesta who is taking advantage of Anawim's newest program Expanding Choices in Housing Opportunities (ECHO). ECHO maximizes Anawim's ability to serve more of the most vulnerable individuals in our community and helps transition households into the level of support that best meets their needs.

According to Cynthia Latcham, Director of Programs & Services, "for some this means greater oversight and for others less." It is all about choice and giving participants a way to exercise that choice in their housing. For Genesta, she is choosing to move to a community closer to her place of employment and choosing to live more independently. The commute to her job in Pleasant Hill requires multiple bus transfers and takes an hour each way. Genesta also has a dream of becoming a foster parent someday. Moving out of supportive housing will allow her to work toward that dream.

Anawim Housing staff provide support as participants prepare to move on. Taz Clayburn-Stills is a Program Manager on the frontlines of this effort. She works closely with households who are ready and have a desire to move off of Anawim's Permanent Supportive Housing programs. "ECHO is the next step," says Taz, "it's a final step toward independence, and we provide support to bridge the gap."

Taz helps participants cultivate lists of apartments, prepare for meetings with landlords, and understand the responsibilities that come with signing a new lease. "There are new expectations and new relationships," says Taz. The change can

hard to ensure participants are ready. "If they aren't there yet, we don't push them," she says. "We want them to be confident and successful."

Through ECHO, tenants have access to assistance for moving costs and security deposits.

They are also able to stay connected with Anawim for six months after—


providing continuity and ongoing support. As individuals like Genesta move on, Anawim can offer supportive housing to individuals experiencing homelessness who require a higher level of care. That's where Supportive Services Manager Stacie O'Connor comes in.

Stacie is working with ten new individuals who have secured stable housing with Anawim — helping them overcome the challenges of moving from homelessness into an apartment they can call their own. From locating furniture and understanding their health insurance coverage to navigating their new neighborhood and the expectations that come with renting an apartment, Stacie is there to listen, gather resources, and problem-solve. "If you've been camping outdoors, living inside is a new world. There are new rules and limitations," says Stacie.

ECHO gives individuals and families who have achieved housing stability choice about their future. It increases Anawim's capacity so we can serve more individuals—ultimately working to reduce and end homelessness in Des Moines.

"I know what it is like to be homeless, and it reminds me of what I went through," says Genesta, reflecting on what it means for her to leave Anawim Housing, "there are so many others who could use the support."

Genesta is ready to move on from Anawim Housing through our ECHO program, after having achieved housing stability and full-time employment



Healing Through Art with Full Circle

The goal of Anawim Housing's weekly Full Circle peer support group is to combat loneliness and build community. With our current health crisis, physically gathering is not possible. We know that social isolation can wreak havoc on people's lives. Studies have shown that loneliness is just as lethal as smoking 15 cigarettes per day and that lonely people are 50% more likely to die prematurely than those with healthy social relationships.

A few weeks before Full Circle paused its in-person meetings, the group took time to create art together. We have found that artistic expression can foster healing, boost self-esteem, and help our tenants explore their feelings and emotions. Together, the group reflected on the importance of home. They shared the following thoughts:

- Home is a sense of place
- * It is an anchor
- t is safety and comfort
- * The smell of grandma's cooking
- * A place to gather
- t is peace and joy
- # It is where my cat is
- Home is a locked door
- Thomas is a rooked do.
- A sense of belonging
- # It feels good

After this reflection, each participant put their thoughts on paper. Through art, they used words and images to express the importance of home and how safety, community, and belonging is essential to the success of all in our community.

Many of our tenants have lost their jobs or have had hours cut, and all are sacrificing in order to keep their families fed and housed. For some of our tenants, paying next month's rent will be a hardship.

NAVIGATING THROUGH TIMES OF UNCERTAINTY

The affordable housing development industry is facing interesting times. With the massive changes day-to-day with the Coronavirus pandemic, we are heading into a very unknown world. State housing agencies continue to shrink the low income housing tax credits they make available for housing projects in an attempt to spread those funds to more projects. This requires developers to find

ways to decrease costs in an economy where construction costs continue to rise above the rate of inflation. In addition, there is the cycle of the market being close to an all-time long run and the uncertainty of a recession that puts us in a more defensive position.
